A Note from the Alumni Association President



Welcome to the Methodist Alumni Association. This year marks the 120th year since the founding of the first nursing program at Methodist. It was the Deaconess Hospital School of Nursing and the first graduating class was in 1902. What do you think the founders would think today if they could tour the hospital and look at the advancements of the college? We have now expanded into a full health sciences college with the recent addition of the Medical and Life Sciences degree, which will produce future providers of care.

The purpose of the Alumni Board is to support and mentor future graduates; to promote a strong relationship between alumni and Methodist College; advance the needs of alumni; achieve the college goal to support and engage our alumni; and lastly, develop an awareness of Methodist College history, accomplishments, programs, and offerings.

Each year, the Methodist Alumni Association engages with students in back to school events to kick-off a new school year. We offer students an alumni roundtable event, providing an opportunity to interview alumni about their careers. We also host a luncheon for graduating seniors and provide a small gift, usually an Alumni Association travel mug, and encourage them to become active in the Alumni Association. Mentor: Take time to mentor students.


Name Drop: Remember Methodist College when you are asked where you went to school, you've done great!

Distinguished Alumna of the Year!

Each year, the Alumni Awards are held in conjunction with the Alumni Reunion Luncheon. With the reunion cancellation, the Alumni Board still felt it important to recognize an outstanding alum, especially this year. The alumni award is presented to an alum who demonstrates the values of the Methodist Alumni Association.

The Distinguished Alumna of the Year Award was presented to Jenifer Patton, Class of 1999. Jenifer completed the nursing program at Methodist and went on to complete an Associate in Arts degree and a Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN). She earned a 4.0 GPA while working towards her bachelor's degree. She was involved in numerous student organizations at Methodist. After graduation, she continued to stay involved in career organizations and her alma mater. In addition to the Methodist Distinguished Alumna of the Year Award, she has been recognized for her dedication and volunteerism.

During Jenifer's time at Methodist, she served as Secretary of the Yearbook Committee, Library Committee Chairperson for Student Government, Vice-President of Student Government, and Social Committee Chairperson. She was even selected to be a delegate to the National Student Nurse's Convention in Arizona. Jenifer continued her involvement while earning her BSN at Illinois State University Mennonite College of Nursing. There she served on the executive board of the Golden Key International Honor Society, Curriculum Committee Chairperson, Student Nurse Association member, Senior Student Alumni Representative for Student Nurse Association, and many other school and community organizations. She serves as a Director on the Mennonite Nurses Alumni Organization Board, previously serving six years as President.

Jenifer's hard work has earned her recognition on the National Dean's List, Red Tassel Chapter of Mortar Board, and RN/BSN sequence track class speaker for graduation in 2004 at Illinois State University. Upon graduation, she was awarded the Geriatric Nursing Excellence Award in Clinical Practice. In 2018, Jenifer received the Mennonite Nursing Alumni Organization at Illinois State University Service Award. Jenifer is also a member of the Sigma Theta Tau International Honor Society of Nursing.



Jenifer began her career as staff nurse on a medical/oncology unit at OSF Saint Joseph Medical Center then as an office nurse at an asthma, allergy, and immunology specialty office with Dr. Anjuli Nayak. She continued on becoming a wound clinic nurse at BroMenn Wound Healing Center, a charge nurse at Martin Health Care Center, and nurse case manager at Midwest Regional Pain Center – all in the Bloomington/Normal, Illinois area.



Medical & Life Sciences Degree Launches

Methodist College is expanding on its mission to educate healthcare professionals and is rolling out a new Bachelor of Science in Medical and Life Sciences degree. A team of administrators and faculty designed the new baccalaureate program to provide preparatory education in the areas of Biology, Pre-Medicine, Pre-Dentistry, Pre-Pharmacy, and Pre-Physician Assistant. The college designed the program to meet the needs of employers to recruit medical providers locally to stay and practice in Central Illinois.

"We know that local students leave the Peoria area to be educated in pre-professional programs and subsequently pursue careers in communities outside of the region," said Methodist College Dean of Arts and Sciences Dr. Eileen Setti. "Our goal is that through this program, students will be introduced to the many health career opportunities in our region, and they will want to return to practice after they obtain their advanced degrees. We are creating a pathway to regional institutions like the University of Illinois College of Medicine in Peoria. We are 'growing our own' healthcare professionals to serve our communities right here in Central Illinois."

Students will be able to start at Methodist College directly from high school, or be admitted with approved transfer credits from other accredited colleges and universities. Methodist College will be partnering with community colleges to develop articulation agreements that will streamline the transfer opportunities for students who choose to start their higher education at a community college.



"This new degree fits perfectly in our growing portfolio of academic programs," added Setti. "For more than one hundred years, the college has successfully supplied the region with outstanding nursing professionals. More recently, the college has expanded degree programs to include Healthcare Management, Social Work, Medical Assistant, and Nurse Assistant. These new programs are steadily growing and provide new professionals to the healthcare and human service labor force."

Celebrating 120 Years, continued from back cover - Students also wore uniforms which included a white cap. The uniform went through a series of changes. What began as a white long sleeve dress, became a blue and white check pattern with an apron then to a stripe pattern wash-and-wear material. The first short-sleeve uniform was introduced in 1922 and the first pantsuit-style was allowed in 1972. Throughout the years there was the "White Cap Chorus" and "The Nightingalers" band. The "Stethoscope" served as a student newsletter and the "Premier" and "Quatrefoil" were names for yearbooks. Student Government was established in 1949.

From expansion and new buildings to student activities and moving up days, Methodist has always provided the best education to students. Our history and alumni have built a strong foundation for what is now a premier healthcare college with multiple bachelor degree programs, certificate programs, and Master in Nursing program.

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Did You Know?



Methodist College is celebrating 120 years!

In 1900, the Deaconess Home and Hospital opened in Peoria, Illinois. A small hospital and nurses training school was founded by three Deaconesses of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The original property at 221 N. Glen Oak Avenue, on the bluff overlooking the Illinois River, was purchased from Mrs. Lydia Bradley. The original training was for two years and students had to be over 21 years of age. Each student received a monthly stipend of four dollars per month the first year and five dollars per month the second year. This continued for several years until tuition was charged. In 1902, the first five students graduated, May Charlesworth Mowrey became the first alum.

As the hospital and school grew, new buildings were established. By 1968, Methodist Hospital had 640 beds. In 1973, more expansion plans were announced including demolition of Heidrich Hall, home to the School of Nursing. The school was moved to another building. Throughout the years, student nurses lived in a variety of dormitories, one of the most memorable to current alumni being Helen House. Helen House was developed by an initial gift from an anonymous donor and named in honor of a family member of the donor. Helen House even had a tunnel leading to the hospital. Each dormitory had a housemother who was an important part of student life. The housemother took messages, welcomed visitors, and assisted students. They would also make sure students were studying in the evening and not getting into trouble, though we've heard stories of alumni playing practical jokes on the housemothers. Continued on page 5...
