Chancellor's Letter

Greetings Methodist Alumni,

I have just completed my first academic year as chancellor and it has been a fabulous experience. The best part, as always, is graduation. We awarded 69 diplomas in December 2018 and another 75 in May. Of course most of those diplomas were bachelor of science degrees in nursing. We also awarded bachelor's degrees in health sciences and several master's degrees in nursing. Equally exciting was this May, we graduated our first four students

earning certificates as medical assistants. All four students took the certification exam from the National Healthcare Association and scored 89% or above. Well above the national average of 75%. Our excellent scores are a credit to the rigor and excellent preparation in our program. We owe extensive credit to our Medical Assistant program coordinator and instructor Courtney Gehrig!

We purchased some great new education equipment this academic year, funded by the Methodist I Proctor Foundation and a U.S. Health Resources & Services Administration grant. The first is an Anatomage table. They describe this as a "comprehensive 3D visualization tool with intuitive hands-on interface to allow for a quick analysis and examination, for medical education, patient diagnosis, and dynamic presentations." It "features the most accurate human anatomy and patient data of any technology available. Powerful hardware and software makes it the preferred solution for medical applications." Words alone cannot describe how awesome this teaching tool really is for our students. Type in "Anatomage" in a YouTube search field and check out videos of this device.

The second outstanding piece of equipment we purchased is our new birthing simulator made by Gaumard®. The "mother" is named Victoria and the "baby" is named Tori. They describe it as providing experiences "from early pregnancy complications, high-risk deliveries, and postpartum emergencies to non-gravid scenarios for general nursing care. Victoria simulates a full range of obstetrical events to facilitate teamwork and deepen critical thinking skills in learners of all levels. More than a childbirth simulator, Victoria is a complete simulation solution developed from decades of obstetrical experience. It is a comprehensive package of tools and support designed to help improve patient safety in women's health through education and training." This simulator is so real when you are holding the baby, it's hard to remember it runs on a rechargeable batters, not milk! Victoria can give birth a myriad times per day and never gets tired. And we can "perform" a C-section on her, too.

On the academic side of the house, we have repackaged our health sciences major and named the degree "Bachelor of Science in Health Management." The new name is more descriptive of the program focus and will better help us attract new students. We have also been approved to offer our pre-licensure, graduate entry master of science degree in nursing. This new MSN program will start the first cohort this fall. Twenty-one months later, I will award diplomas to the first graduating class. The fall 2019 cohort is already full and we are confident this high interest will continue indefinitely!

History Presented at Local Museum


Methodist College was honored to provide a public presentation at the Peoria Riverfront Museum on the history of nursing and Methodist College. Shelley Riney '80, Methodist College nursing faculty gave the presentation "Healing, Teaching, Caring" on March 31, which focused on the exciting history of nursing from Florence Nightingale to today. She also explored the history of Methodist College and its rich heritage in Central Illinois.



The history of Methodist began when the deaconesses of the Methodist Episcopal

The presentation was part of the Peoria Riverfront Museum's "10 Medical Inventions that Changed the World," which tells the stories of pioneering medicine. The exhibit

featured several artifacts from Methodist College including a uniform cape, a diploma from the Training School for Nurses, and photographs of nursing classes.



Innovative Education Open House

Methodist College recently added more state-of-the-art tools and technology that will be used in the education of future healthcare and human services professionals. On May 23, Methodist College hosted an open house to showcase the new technology. Among attendees were Methodist College staff, faculty, board members, alumni, and local community members.

The open house featured the new lifelike childbirth simulator that is part of the college's simulation education program. The simulator also features newborn manikins and a full-term baby simulator that provides participants with realistic visual and tactile experiences. The Anatomage table was also on display; see photo at right. The table is a fully segmented real human 3D anatomy system. The Mobile Outreach Learning Lab for Integrative Education or MOLLIE vehicle was also available for tours. The former mobile mammography unit was transformed into a vehicle that will provide students an opportunity to provide health and social wellness education and assessments in the community. Funding for each of these was provided through various grants, including grants from the UnityPoint Health



Methodist I Proctor Foundation, Human Resources & Services Administration of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, and the Telligen Foundation.

Those in attendance were impressed with the lifelike simulator, the capabilities of the Anatomage table, and the opportunities the MOLLIE vehicle provides to the community. Methodist College is truly advancing minds and advancing healthcare everyday!

RN to BSN Program Revisions

A revision in the curriculum of the online Registered Nurse (RN) to Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) degree at Methodist College will allow students in the program to complete the degree in less time. The revision reduces the required credit hours from 43 to 30. The new program, known as the RN to BSN program, is designed with 30 credits of nursing courses that expand the nurse's knowledge in several areas, including leadership, evidence-based practice, and population health. The degree is designed to provide the maximum flexibility for students while at the same time, maintaining the requirements for students to earn a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree.

The RN to BSN program allows licensed registered nurses, who earned their nursing education credentials through an accredited diploma program or associate degree program, to take courses to earn a bachelor's degree in nursing. Students will be able to transfer up to 90 of the total 120 credits required to complete a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree. Student who have fewer than 90 credits to transfer may need to take additional elective courses in order to fulfill the 120 credit requirement.

The revised program offers many advantages: students can complete the program in as little as three semesters depending on whether they are a part-time or full-time student, they are able to plan their study time around their work schedules, there are no on-campus requirements, and they can plan their practicum experiences to match their work schedules and professional goals. In addition, Methodist College offers a pathway for the registered nurse to bridge to the Master of Science in Nursing program. More information is available at www.MethodistCOL.edu/rn-bsn.
